


Democracy in Action

You can see the cogs whirring...

It was a privilege to being able to watch a numeracy lesson and see the enthusiasm the whole class had for learning. I especially liked the use of visual aids such as tiny bricks that could be split into 100s, 10s and units and to see the cogs whirring as the children got a grasp of the concept of subtraction. The idea of rows made it easier for the teacher to tell when a child might be struggling or losing concentration. The fact that they now work with a learning partner meant that confidence could be seen in working out the solution and coming up with the answer. Each child was given the opportunity to have their ideas and answers listened to. The whole lesson, pulling on the resources of the interactive whiteboard, made it fun as well as educational.


New Lunchtimes – a great success

Bite-size chunks

We observed maths and literacy teaching in Years 1 and 5 to see how children were taught core concepts. The teachers started with 'bite size chunks', using a variety of methods to ensure children understood basic points such as adding and subtracting pairs of numbers to make 10 and the use of colons, commas and speech marks in the correct part of a sentence. The children have a range of abilities, but through repetition. revision and applying the concepts to 'real life' examples and stories, we saw the children make significant progress in the space of a lesson. We were particularly struck by the confidence of children to ask questions and the support they provided to each other when working with their learning partners.

Maths and support

I had a fantastic day visiting several classes. A particular highlight for me was taking part in a maths lesson. The lesson cleverly developed the concepts the class had been working on all week. Use of number blocks clearly introduced the concepts visually to pupils and helped them understand how to apply the same concepts to solving problems on paper. It was also great to see how learning partners helped support each other and ensure that by the end of the lesson most of the class had "got it".
