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SAFER INTERNET DAY 2016

Next week sees Safer Internet Day, one day to reinforce the messages we give to children about how to be safe online. Our children are, at younger and younger ages, becoming 'digital natives' and as adults we use technology as a natural part of daily life that was unimaginable even when most of us were children ourselves. Because of this, adults can often be unaware of the importance of safe behaviour online, but it is as important to teach children about this and be aware of what your children are doing online as it is to teach them the Green Cross Code and supervise children near busy roads.

A great resource for parents can be found at http://parentinfo.org/ and if you want to work at home with your children about online safety, you can look at https://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/8 10/cybercafe/ together (KS2).

Some essential online rules for children include:

- Never befriend online someone you don't know in real life.
- Know your privacy settings and set them to 'friends only' where possible- not 'friends of friends'.
- Do not post detailed personal information- particularly full name and contact details, or your username for other social media platforms. General information is fine.
- Don't lie about your age.
- Don't post photos of yourself or your friends with your school uniform/ logo clearly visible.
- Never share passwords.
- Don't ask a question you might not like the answer to.
- Tell a grown up you trust about anything you see or read which makes you feel uncomfortable. You can also report it using the CEOP button or you can ring ChildLine (0800 1111).

Please note that where school is aware that children have accounts on social media which contravene the terms and conditions of the site (such as being under 13), we will take action where we can to report this to the site to have the account taken down.

A plea for safety at drop off and pick up at school, to all families. It has been drawn to my attention that a small number of parents/ carers are parking partly on the pavement on Piper Lane/ Bradford Road, thus making it impossible for parents with buggies to get past. Similarly, I understand that a number of families are crossing the road near the advertising hoardings. It is really important that parked vehicles obstruct neither traffic nor pedestrians, nor obscure vision for pedestrians and road

users. However, I must ask all families to resist the temptation to cross Piper Lane/Bradford Road at this point but to continue up towards Scarborough Road and use the pelican crossing, which was installed after a lengthy campaign to improve safety for Westgate families. Crossing at any other point is at your own risk, regardless of how safe your crossing point appears to be.

ROAD SAFETY PART TWO

On Monday this week, Years 5 & 6 had Pedestrian and Scooter training, following reports of some dangerous trips to and from school and a lack of regard for other pedestrians on the part

of some over-enthusiastic scooterers! Next month will see pedestrian training for all other classes, again provided by Leeds Road Safety Team. On another safety note, we are also welcoming the Canals & River Trust next month, to give a talk to the whole school about water safety near rivers.

Y5/6 BAKE SALE

Children in Y6 have decided to organise a bake sale to sell to children on Monday at break time, to raise money for Martin House and Cancer Research UK- two charities

which mean something personal to children in the class. Children in Y1 to Y6 can bring in a little bit of money to buy a little treat to eat at break time- and leftovers will sold after school. The prices are 30p for buns and 20p for biscuits. There will also be a raffle for a large cake – 20p per ticket.

BREAK TIME SNACKS

The bake sale mentioned above is a rare treat at break time. However, I have noticed recently that some children are bringing inappropriate snacks for morning break in KS2. To remind parentsthe only acceptable snacks are fresh or dried fruit, or a piece of cheese. Fruit winders, biscuits, chocolate, rice crispy squares, snack bars and crisps are all *not* appropriate snacks and will be taken from children if found in school, to be returned at the end of the day. Foundation Stage and Key Stage 1 children receive free fruit and vegetable snacks as part of a national scheme, and Key Stage 2 children are able to purchase fresh fruit at break time for 20p a piece (and you can pay in advance if you wish).
